# **TOPIC:** Policy Revisions re: the Treatment of Transgender Students

### ACPS 2025 STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL:

#### SUMMARY:

Several School Board policy and regulatory revisions are being proposed to reflect the Virginia Department of Education's (VDOE's) <u>Model Policies for the Treatment of Transgender Students</u> in <u>Virginia's Public Schools</u> ("Model Policies"), developed in response to the amendment of <u>Va.</u> <u>Code § 221.-23.3</u> by the Virginia General Assembly. The proposed revisions are compiled from the following policy manual classifications:

G Policies: Personnel I Policies: Instructional Program J Policies: Students

These revisions highlight eight common issues, identified in the legislation, regarding the treatment of transgender students. They are required to be addressed by School Board policies at the beginning of the 2021-22 school year, in a manner that is consistent with the *Model* 

Policies. They are:

- 1. Compliance with applicable nondiscrimination laws;
- 2. Maintenance of a safe and supportive learning environment free from discrimination and harassment for all students;
- 3. Prevention of and response to bullying and harassment;
- 4. Maintenance of student records;
- 5. Identification of students;
- 6. Protection of student privacy and the confidentiality of sensitive information;
- 7. Enforcement of sex-based dress codes; and
- 8. Student participation in sex-specific school activities and events and use of school facilities. ("Activities and events" do not include athletics.)

# BACKGROUND:

<u>Va. Code § 221.-23.3</u> requires each school board in Virginia to adopt policies that are consistent with, and which may be more comprehensive than, the VDOE <u>Model Policies for the Treatment</u> <u>of Transgender Students in Virginia's Public Schools</u> at the beginning of the 2021-22 school year.

As stated in the introduction to the Model Policies,

#### **BOARD MEMO**

"In June 2020, an advisory committee was formed to review model policies, local policies throughout the nation, and resources pertaining to the treatment of transgender students in public schools. The committee included school-based personnel representing diverse Superintendent's Regions and disciplines, representatives from state professional associations, parent representatives, student representatives, representatives from advocacy organizations, and specialists from the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE). The development of these model policies is a result of consultation and collaboration with multiple stakeholders throughout the Commonwealth with a variety of backgrounds and expertise." (*Model Policies*, p. 5.)

The Model Policies define "transgender" as:

"A self-identifying term that describes a person whose gender identity is different from their sex assigned at birth. A transgender girl is a girl who was presumed to be male when she was born, and a transgender boy is a boy who was presumed to be female when he was born. Note that there is a wide range of gender identities in addition to transgender male and transgender female, such as nonbinary." (*Model Policies*, p. 7.)

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

The Superintendent recommends that the School Board review the policy and regulatory revisions regarding the treatment of transgender students.

### IMPACT:

Revising the attached policies as proposed supports the "key guiding principle of the model policies...that all children have a right to learn, free from discrimination and harassment." These policy and regulatory revisions seek to "minimize social stigmatization for [transgender] students and maximize opportunities for social integration so that all students have an equal opportunity to attend school, be engaged, and achieve academic success." (*Model Policies*, pp. 8-9.)

As stated by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) in a resolution, "all persons, including children and adolescents who are diverse in their sexuality and gender identities, expression, and/or presentation, have the inherent human right to equal opportunity and a physically and psychologically safe environment within all institutions." (*Model Policies*, p. 9.)
