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### APPROVAL PROCESS FOR RESEARCH STUDIES

The School Board recognizes the potential benefits of research conducted by qualified individuals, organizations, or institutions in developing, validating, and standardizing programs and strategies within the field of education. The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to approve research studies where it has been determined that such studies will confer benefits to ACPS; result in no harm to students, employees, or other participants; ensure appropriate privacy protections; and impose no significant burden on ACPS activities and operations.

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This policy provides guidance regarding the review and approval of all research studies in AlexandriaCity Public Schools (ACPS).

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With the exception of the Exempt Research described below, research activities conducted within ACPS must receive prior written approval from the Superintendent or designee. The Research Application Form is available on the ACPS website. This section describes the types of research considered for approval.

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### **External Research**

18 This policy applies to all requests by individuals and organizations to conduct research activities 19 in ACPS or receive, for research purposes, identifiable and non-identifiable ACPS student or 20 employee data that are not otherwise publicly available under the Virginia Freedom of Information 21 Act. This policy applies to external researchers as well as ACPS employees who wish to conduct 22 research or data collection activities when not assigned to do so by ACPS as a part of their job 23 responsibilities.

### **Research Involving Sensitive Topics**

This policy also applies to surveys conducted by ACPS employees, ACPS students, or external 26 researchers asking about such sensitive topics as defined in Policy KFB as: political affiliations 27 or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; mental or psychological problems of the 28 student or student's family; sex behavior and attitudes; illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or 29 demeaning behavior; critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family 30 relationships; legally recognized privileged relationships, such as lawyers, doctors, or ministers of 31 religion; religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; or 32 income (other than as required by law to determine program eligibility). 33

### Exempt Research

Except for surveys including sensitive topics as outlined above, approval from the Superintendent or designee is not required for research conducted by ACPS in connection with evaluating and implementing instructional programs, and work done by ACPS employees in the normal course of their employment. Staff will obtain approval from their supervisor in advance of conducting research.

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Research - Any systemic investigation, including instrument development, observation, testing
 (including survey), data analysis, and/or evaluation, that is designed to develop or contribute to knowledge
 that can be applied to contexts beyond the setting in which the investigation took place.

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Human Research - Any systematic investigation, including research development, testing and
evaluation, utilizing human subjects, that is designed to develop or contribute to generalized knowledge.
Human research does not include research exempt from federal research regulation pursuant to 45 C.F.R.
§ 46.101(b).

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# 53 RESEARCH SCREENING COMMITTEE 54

The Superintendent or designee establishes a committee composed of knowledgeable employees to 55 conduct screenings of research requests. The research screening committee will be composed of 56 representatives with a diverse set of backgrounds to ensure the competent, complete, and professional 57 review of research activities. No member of the committee may be directly involved in the proposed 58 59 research or have administrative approval authority over the proposed research except in connection with their responsibilities as a member of the committee. In deciding whether to recommend approval of 60 proposed research, the committee will consider the factors listed in Va. Code § 32.1-162.19. The 61 committee will convene twice annually to screen research requests following the deadlines for all 62 63 applications of June 30 and December 31.

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## 65 AUTHORITY TO APPROVE

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Based on the recommendations from the screening committee, the Superintendent or their designee may approve or deny applications for research. If approved, the Superintendent or their designee may revoke such authorization at any time based on procedural violations, ethical issues, a change of priority or interest by ACPS, lack of funding or resources, or other good cause. If the research is being conducted by an individual or organization with an Institutional Review Board (IRB), both ACPS and IRB approval must be obtained.

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# 74 CONFIDENTIALITY, CONSENT, AND INSPECTION RIGHTS

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### **Research Data Confidentiality Agreement**

All researcher applicants must agree to the ACPS Research Data Confidentiality Agreement which
 includes topics such as data collection, data sharing, data destruction, data access, and security
 controls.

81 Confidentiality of Personally-Identifiable Student and Employee Information

No personally-identifiable information (PII) concerning students or employees may be disclosed to researchers unless such disclosure is authorized by written consent of the student (if over 18 years of age), parent/guardian, or the employee, unless the disclosure is authorized by state and federal law and consistent with the School Board policies and regulations. FERPA defines the term personally identifiable information to include direct identifiers (such as a student's or other family member's name) and indirect identifiers (such as a student's date of birth, place of birth, or
mother's maiden name).

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101 102 **Informed Consent** 

Research and data collection activities will comply with all state and federal requirements
 pertaining to informed consent, specifically Va. Code § 32.1-162.18.

### 94 Survey Inspection, Consent, and Opt Out Rights

Parents or guardians will be provided with advance notice of, and the opportunity to inspect, any
 survey asking students about sensitive topics described in section II-B of this policy. For any non federally-funded survey, a parent or guardian will be provided the opportunity to opt the student
 out of participation in the survey with no consequences. These survey inspection, consent, and
 opt-out rights also apply to those surveys including sensitive topics administered by ACPS as part
 of its instructional program.

#### Use of Name

103 The use of the division's name or the names of its schools in published research is prohibited 104 unless the researcher(s) receive written permission from the Superintendent or designee.

 I.APPLICABILITY

#### A. External Research

This policy applies to all requests by individuals and organizations to conduct research activities in ACPS or receive, for research purposes, identifiable and non-identifiable ACPS student or employee data that are not otherwise publicly available under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act. This policy applies to external researchers as well as ACPS employees who wish to conduct research or data collection activities when not assigned to do so by ACPS as a part of their job responsibilities.

#### **B.** Research Involving Sensitive Topics

This policy also applies to surveys conducted by ACPS employees, ACPS students, or external researchers asking about such sensitive topics as defined in <u>Policy KFBPolicy KFB</u> as: political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family; sex behavior and attitudes; illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior; critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships; legally recognized privileged relationships, such as lawyers, doctors, or ministers of religion; religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or student's parent/guardian; or income (other than as required by law to determine program eligibility).

#### **C.** Exempt Research

Except for surveys including sensitive topics as outlined above, approval from the Superintendent or his or her designee is not required for research conducted by ACPS in connection with evaluating and implementing instructional programs, and work done by ACPS employees in the normal course of their employment. <u>SIt is expected that staff</u> will obtain approval from a <u>their</u> supervisor in advance of conducting research.
