Develop a data system and data sharing agreements with key partners to capture how children are being served by and benefiting from the early care and education system.	SBA has contracted with a data consultant to assist in the development of a data and evaluation system. The work will be completed in three phases, which include: delineation of key indicators, identification of available data and creation of governance policy, and the creation of a data system and dashboard. The engagement began March 1 <sup>st</sup> and is expected to be completed July 31 <sup>st</sup> .
Better understand the gaps and opportunities related to existing funding streams and capacity, including how to better combine and optimize funding for a more equitable, sustainable, and family and child- centric system.	Building on the work of the local funding pilot, SBA has organized a Finance Committee that will collaboratively plan how best to utilize local funding and other grant opportunities to support our work and build a comprehensive system. The committee's first meeting is scheduled for March 24 <sup>th</sup> .

Increase the number of childcare centers, preschools, and family childcare homes that are accredited, maintaining accreditation status annually, and/or participating in the Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS)	Nine new programs have joined Virginia Quality (VQ) so far this year and there are currently five programs in progress to advance to Levels 2 and 3. VQ Technical Assistants continue to work with participating providers on their Quality Improvement Plans, Quality Rating levels, professional learning and trainings. VQ providers received toys, PPE, and other materials during the month of March to support their programs.
