CDC K-12 SCHOOL METRICS


The CDC have published a revised set of Indicators and Thresholds for Community Transmission of COVID-19 (reported over 7 days) in the CDC's new Operational Strategy for K-12 Schools through Phased Mitigation. These indicators and thresholds can be used to assess the current level of community transmission (low, moderate, substantial or high) and help communities better understand which mitigation strategies, learning modes, and testing are recommended based on the level of community transmission.

VDH also recommends that schools evaluate the transmission in school, or "Level of Impact to School" which is described in the revised VDH/VDOE Interim Guidance for PreK12 Reopening. (www.vdh.virginia.gov/content/up-loads/sites/182/2021/01/Interim-Guidance-to-K-12-School-Reopening.pdf) . Schools should continue to implement the five key mitigation strategies (masks, physical distancing, hand hygiene/respiratory etiquette, cleaning/disinfection, and contact tracing in collaboration with the local health department) no matter the level of community transmission.


A school division's capacity to successfully implement mitigation strategies, the level of school impact, AND local community disease data should be carefully factored into school operations plans. The CDC indicators and thresholds serve to inform decision making, but should not solely dictate the decisions that school divisions make to best serve their communities.

- Students with Disabilities in grades 6-12 enrolled in the Citywide Special Education program who opt into in-person learning. Citywide self-contained students are students with Intellectual Disabilities, Autism, Multiple Disabilities or Emotional Disabilities.
- Students with Disabilities in grades 6-12 who receive self-contained Language Arts and Math instruction who opt into inperson learning.
- English Learners in grades 6-12 who are newcomers (three years or less in the United States) and who opt into in-person learning.



Recess Logistics Update

Principals were provided a Recess Guidance Document						
Safety Logistics	 Students wash or sanitize their hands before and after recess. Designate specific entrance and exit doors. Maintain 6-10 ft of physical distancing based on intensity of recess activities. Structured teacher-led activities are suggested to ensure social distancing. Limit shared equipment use during recess, unless a sanitation plan is in place. 					
Activity Logistics	 Adding rotations of zones for classes is ideal for equity (daily, weekly, etc.). Suggested activity zones: blacktops, field spaces, playgrounds, gymnasium, hallways, classrooms, and the auditorium. Suggested recess activities: individual play, quiet play, creative play, dance, non-competitive games, and competitive games A provided list of over 75 recess activities ideas was also shared. 					
Playground + Playground Equipment	 Although VDOE provided guidance regarding playgrounds and playground equipment, ACPS is still working on the logistics for using the equipment safely at all schools. ACPS will work with principals and AHD to provide specific guidance for use of playground equipment following Spring Break. At this time, we are still prohibiting playground equipment use during recess but have 					

provided schools several activities to use while children are on the playground.



Summer Learning Update

The goal of summer learning is to engage, enrich, and prepare students for the anticipation of September 2021.

Beginning	July 6 - August 12, 2021 (Traditional Four Week Session + Additional Targeted Virtual Two Week Session)		
Prioritizing	PreK-5 (with SEAL needs), English Learners, Students with Disabilities, and high school students in credit recovery programs for in-person instruction - all other students will be taught virtually		
Continuing	Enrichment programming virtually, college courses for high school students		
Developing	A partnership with our community partners on kindergarten through 5th grade students participating in camp and summer experiences after summer learning		
Engaging	Content through learning kits, enrichment opportunities, and a blend of synchronous and asynchronous instruction to afford students the opportunity to self-monitor and receive feedback and coaching		
Using	A variety of data points to target instruction based on student strengths and opportunities		
Preparing	Rising sixth grade and secondary students for the next grade level through boost courses		
Offering	Additional opportunities for SEAL supports through office hours, 1:1 check-ins, and groups by topic
