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Students may express their personal beliefs, including about religion, in homework, artwork, and other written and oral assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of their submissions. Such home and classroom work is evaluated by ordinary academic standards of substance and relevance and against other legitimate pedagogical concerns identified by the school. Such work must be consistent with other Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) policies and regulations.
