Ms. Baker informed the CCSB that the City Schools Capital Council's team has been rebooted and has been meeting monthly to ensure that appropriate coordination and oversight on joint projects that are impacted by the CIP. 	c. Joint Capital Planning/Implementation	The Joint Facilities Master Plan process began in Fall 2019 and work continued through the pandemic. The JFMP is a living document which entails information on all the City and School facilities and land in the City, including an analysis of the 60 buildings and 54 additional sites. This document will continue to be used as a way to examine what is available to assist with the usage needs of both the City and ACPS.  The CCSB requested a joint work session in the fall to revisit the process on both the ACPS and City side ensure that space will be available for the future.
