As more in-person engagements return, KFY has focused on community outreach events: • Community Baby Shower – held May 6 th at Casa Chirilagua and attended by 25 expectant/new moms. We are looking to host them quarterly throughout the city. The next one will be in August at William Ramsay Recreation Center. • Family Fun Day sponsored by Amazon and hosted by The Center for Alexandria's Children, KFY, ACPS, and RPCA. Attended by 350 adults and 400 children. • Family Engagement Webinar was held on June 7th "Empowering Your Interactions Over the Summer with Your Children" led by a panel of Alexandria's early childhood agencies and programs (City of Alexandria, ACPS, Kids' First Years, Campagna Center, The Child and Family Network Center) • Kids' First Years and ACPS created Summer Learning Choice Boards offering families hands-on activities to engage their children over the summer.
