Public Health Indicators (as of 6/12/2021)

CDC K-12 SCHOOL WETKICS

The CDC have published a revised set of Indicators and Thresholds for Community Transmission of COVID-19 (reported over 7 days) in the CDC's new Operational Strategy for K-12 Schools through Phased Mitigation. These indicators and thresholds can be used to assess the current level of community transmission (low, moderate, substantial or high) and help communities better understand which mitigation strategies, learning modes, and testing are recommended based on the level of community transmission.

VDH also recommends that schools evaluate the transmission in school, or "Level of Impact to School" which is described in the revised VDH/VDOE Interim Guidance for PreK12 Reopening, (www.vdh.virginia.gov/content/up-


loads/sites/182/2021/01/Interim-Guidance-to-K-12-School-Reopening.pdf). Schools should continue to implement the five key mitigation strategies (masks, physical distancing, hand hygiene/respiratory etiquette, cleaning/disinfection, and contact tracing in collaboration with the local health department) no matter the level of community transmission.

A school division's capacity to successfully implement mitigation strategies, the level of school impact, AND local community disease data should be carefully factored into school operations plans. The CDC indicators and thresholds serve to inform decision making, but should not solely dictate the decisions that school divisions make to best serve their communities.


Combined Core Indicator, Alexandria City, 6/12/2021



Core Indicators, Alexandria City, 6/12/2021








Percentage of NAAT (PCR) tests that are positive during the last 7 days**


Percent change in new cases per 100,000 population during the last seven days compared with the previous

Virginia Requirements for Reopening

Date	Action
March 12, 2020	State of emergency declared by Governor Northam due to COVID-19
March 23, 2020	<u>Executive Order Number Fifty-Three</u> closed all K—12 schools in Virginia for the remainder of the academic year
June 9, 2020 - January 14, 2021	Governor Northam <u>announced a phased reopening</u> of Pre-K–12 schools and released <u>updated phase guidance</u> ; Virginia Department of Education and Virginia Department of Health released <u>Interim Guidance</u> : <u>Operational Strategy and Phased Prevention for Virginia PreK-12 Schools</u>
February 5, 2021	Governor Northam directed school superintendents to provide options for in-person learning by March 15, 2021
March 30, 2021	 Governor Northam signed SB 1303: All schools must offer in-person instruction for at least the minimum number of required instructional hours (180 days/990 hours) to any enrolled student during SY 2021–2022 School divisions may also offer a virtual option "Any local school board may, for any period during which the Governor's declaration of a state of emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic is in effect, provide fully remote virtual instruction to any enrolled student upon the request of such student's parent, guardian, or legal custodian."

UPDATE: Summer Learning For All

- **21 programs** this summer
- **ALL** families in grades Pre- K-8 who were invited and accepted for in-person learning have been assigned
- Preparing for 1715 Pre-K through 8th grade for in-person summer learning for all
- Planning for over 3500 students virtual students in various programs
- Expecting 432 special education students for in-person summer learning
- 434 total staff have been hired 335 licensed staff + 99 support staff



Fall Reopening Checklist: Ensuring Student Success

Host Welcoming Events	 Establish a 6.o School Planning Team to prepare students and staff for a successful transition back to five days a week of in-person learning in the fall Prepare and communicate plans for August 20 Step-Up Orientation events for K, grade 1, and Middle School Orientation events for grades 6–7 and families new to the school community.
Ensure Health + Safety	 Confirm and communicate modifications to the Health and Safety Protocols in place as we transition back to school in August. Plan and implement a Simulation Reopening Activity.
Focus on What Matters Most	 Schedule and host an initial School Improvement Plan (SIP) meeting to establish action steps in support of a positive growth mindset with explicit strategies to address anticipated learning loss. Ensure the Master Schedule is intentional in securing time for SEAL and tiered interventions.



Mitigation Against Learning Loss for Fall

Multi-Tiered All schools will focus on **Social**, **Emotional**, **and Academic Learning** (SEAL); chronic absenteeism; and grade distribution through the System of Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS). Support (MTSS) Triangulating Elementary and secondary teams will triangulate performance data from classroom assessments and divisionwide screening measures **Student Data** to identify specific academic needs that drive individualized educational planning. **Progress Professional Learning Communities (PLCs)** - to examine student **Monitoring** performance on unit and common assessments to evaluate students' for the mastery of competencies and skills. **Quarterly Chats** - Quarterly progress monitoring with the superintendent and senior leaders to review student progress metrics and factors associated with instruction and supports to address students' social-emotional and academic learning needs.



Addressing Learning Loss for Fall

measure and address the academic
impact of lost instructional time on all
students, through the implementation of
evidence-based interventions, such as:

- Summer learning and enrichment interventions
- Extended day learning opportunities
- Comprehensive after school programs
- Extended school year programs
 - o Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS)

Virtual Virginia Updates for Fall (2/2)

- Virtual Learning Mentors will be designated by each school.
- The Virtual Learning Mentor is a **coach**, **communicator**, and supports **goal-setting** with students.

Coach

- Nurtures and motivates
- Monitors student progress
- Fosters and supports students' learning through goal-setting



Communicator

- Exceptional written and verbal communicator
- Responsive
- Detail-oriented and proactive in communication regarding students' progress

Goal Setter

- Assist students in setting progress goals
- Adjusts students' goals based on students' needs

Maintain daily time to deliver SEAL curriculum to all students (Tier I) Expansion of RULER curriculum to all schools

 Additional materials supported through Student Services and Equity and Teaching, Learning, and Leadership

Through the MTSS process, provide students with targeted interventions

Specialized Instruction Updates for Fall

Communication	 Communicate with students and parents regarding student progress and any supports that may be needed based on data or observation (i.e., attendance, engagement, participation).
Collaboration	 Plan for co-teaching to ensure best practices and the use of high-yield co-teaching models coupled with the implementation of accommodations listed on students' IEPs. Plan and implement instruction for students with disabilities in city wide programs supported through collaboration with special education teachers and instructional assistants.
Instructional Programming	 Plan and implement lessons addressing the unique instructional needs of Students With Disabilities (SWD) in the general and special education settings. Implement targeted interventions with fidelity for SWD. Collect data related to student progress in reading and math interventions.




Facilities Updates for Fall

Social Distancing	ACPS will not continue with three-feet of social distancing in the Summer and Fall
Cleaning Procedures	Enhanced cleaning procedures will be maintained over summer and into the new school year
Mitigation Measures	 Additional mitigation measures (i.e., temperature screening technology, HEPA air-purifiers, etc.) will remain for the time being
Safety Procedures	 ACPS will modify/adjust safety measures as additional updates and guidance is shared by CDC, VDOE, + AHD
