#### **Capacity Projects Update**

The High School	
Project	

- In FY23 Q2: Building permit was approved, steel erection began, foundations are near complete (except for areas requiring crane access), and concrete work is ongoing
- Anticipated in Q3: Steel erection, concrete work, and mechanical and electrical trades will continue; GMP#4 low voltage package will be approved and executed

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- In FY23 Q2: Exterior enclosure and high roof over the main educational wing are complete; installation of sprayed AVB and wall framing is ongoing. First floor wall close-in has began; mechanical, electrical, and plumbing trades continue on all floors
- Anticipated in Q3: Wall framing and close-ins will continue on all floors; exterior facade and interior facade work will begin

1703 N. Beauregard

- In FY23 Q2: A&E vendor procurement was finalized and design efforts began. Community meeting held in December providing a high level overview of project timeline
- Anticipated in Q3: Planning and design continues; activities for department and technical teams will be concluded, followed and implemented

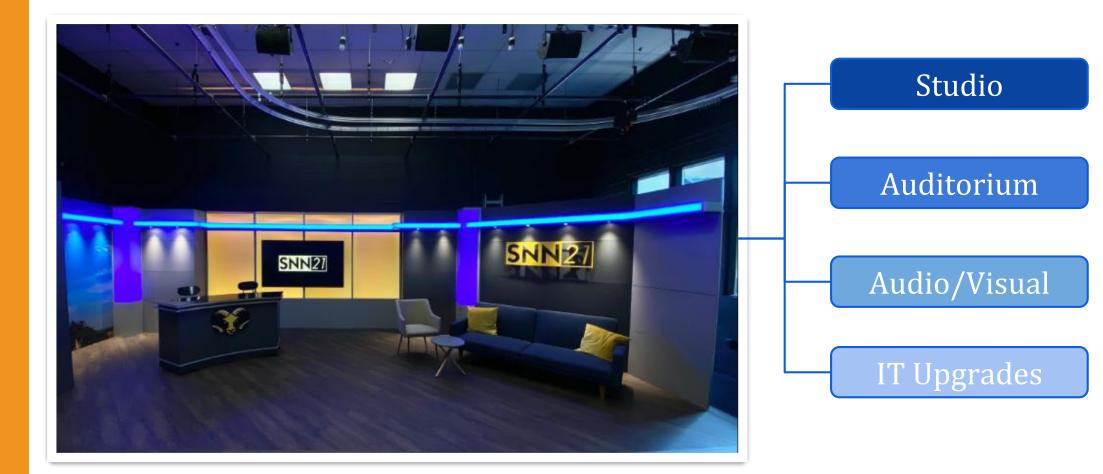

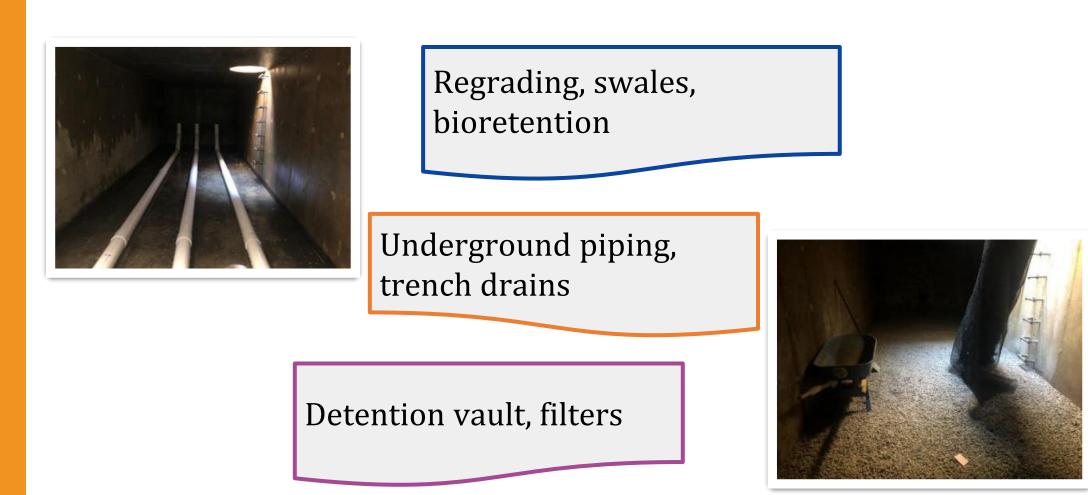
