II.	Major Projects:		
	a. High School Project	On design, we are about 4 to 6 weeks out from 100% completion. For construction, mobilization has started and fencing is being put up and material staging has begun. City and ACPS staff continue to work towards improvement of collaborative processes and made minor adjustments to our continued planning and regular meeting agenda. Sharing best practices on both sides.	
d. Amazon/VA Tech Update	The City will hold their preliminary add/delete tomorrow night. There are a couple of amendments: 1. Follow-up to conversation on fund balance, 2. An add related to the presentation on Out of School Time, there was a contingency for funding to provide resources to support the overall out of school effort. 3. An addition which relates to funding of the Resources Officers, which will take the funds that was in contingency and appropriate it to the APD budget. This will take the policy decision of the SROs and where they work out of the budget process and will be a policy decision that the two bodies will work on together. After tomorrow's meeting we should have a tentative decision of what will be in the approved budget. Our final add/delete is next week and the adoption is on May 4.  The superintendent will present his adjusted budget on May 5. Mayor Wilson would like to know at what point do things become challenging for ACPS when they do not know what State funding will look like. Currently, ACPS has a picture of the different formats that the budget could be. Based on projections, it could be +/- \$1M with State revenue depending on which direction they go.  No Update. e. Safety and Security	ACPS presented the School Board with a revised plan in regards to School-Law Enforcement Partnership (SLEP) Advisory Group and they received feedback from the Board at their March 10 meeting. 		Vice Mayor Jackson would like to know if there will be a liaison for this group. Chair Alderton explained that they did not want to have any influence from elected officials, but regular updates will be provided. Dr. Hart did indicate that there is a spot for a City representative.  Mayor Wilson informed the CCSB that Photo Speed Enforcement has been added to the City budget for five school zones.	
IV.	Other Discussion Items		
	a. Safe Routes to School	The CCSB has received a letter from PTAC regarding safe routes to school.  The letter is related to an incident a few weeks ago near Jefferson-Houston, where a motorist jumped the sidewalk and struck a pedestrian.  • City Staff has been working closely with ACPS to make a number of continued improvements around schools. To date 100 of the 250 recommendations that were included the 2017 Safe Routes to School Audits have been completed. This year the City Manager included \$100K in the CIP for Safe Routes which would fund engineering, improvements and recommendations. There is a little over \$4M in the life of the 10-year plan, which will allow the City to address the concern of having funding in place.  • Council approved a grant request to COG which will allow the City to conduct more audits. The City did receive the grant and anticipate doing the audits.  • City Council made a recommendation in its Add/Delete that Transportation add a Project Manager position which will address some of the projects like this one. - In regards to excessive speed, camera enforcement will allow staff to address. Earlier this year, State Legislation gave the City the ability to reduce speeds from 25 to 15 MPH. This has been an action item the City's Vision Zero (there is no plan to reduce the speeds throughout the City). Looking at introducing slow zones primarily around schools and some residential areas. This will need to have enforcement to be effective.
  - Vice Mayor Jackson feels that enforcement needs to be done no matter what the posted limit is. She has not seen officers around the locations at the times when there are walkers going back and forth to school. Even with speed reduction, by law 15 MPH over the posted speed limit is considered reckless driving. She feels that this should be enforced sooner rather than later.
  - Vice Chair Greene would like to know if there is a requested timeframe to get the proposal back for crossing guards or should one be placed on it?
  - Chair Alderton feels that a realistic job description would need to be created and that work would need to be done for consideration in another budget.
  - Dr. Hutchings feels it would be better to do this when looking at employee compensation studies. This will give a better idea of what is needed and not just coupling it with other positions. He would like to hold off until the fall to begin a study to get the best scenario for this type of position.

ACPS has a Safe Routes to School coordinator and would like to loop them into what the City is doing. They are also looking into if this is a grant-funded position and what will need to be done to make it permanent.
